Heard Any Silence Lately?

Sometimes it takes a little bit of silence to notice how noisy life has gotten. Science is showing that noise is not good for us or the environment. Mark your calendar for our important July 24 program on noise.

What do we know about the impacts of noise, i.e. unwanted sound? For wildlife, noise blocks natural sounds that are important for communication, finding habitat and food, courting and raising families, and avoiding predators. For humans, noise pollution is becoming widely recognized as the cause of many acute and chronic health problems. Consider our routine exposure to indoor sound—appliances, TVs, children playing & arguing. In the warmer weather especially, add in traffic and construction, barking dogs, leaf blowers and lawn mowers, and pickleball plink. Wedding receptions, movie theater previews, personal listening devices, and concerts all assault our ears. (The June 24 Summerfest concert registered 92 decibels measured 30 feet from the stage.)

In addition to our "routine" levels of noise exposure, look at what is facing some Glenview neighborhoods: a proposed outdoor concert venue downtown inches away from a residential area; 500+ trucks moving through the redeveloped Allstate property; proposed I-294 on/off ramps; and public and private pickleball courts.

Greener Glenview believes it is time to educate the public and decision-makers about the impact of noise on our everyday lives as this issue grows in prominence across the nation.

Join Greener Glenview for the important presentation "<u>How Much Noise Is Too</u> Much? It's Not Just Your Hearing Being Harmed".

Glenview, like the rest of the world, is becoming a noisier place. Many people do not know that noise pollution is a major environmental hazard. The goal of this presentation is to help residents, including decision-makers, learn about the harmful impact of noise on our brains, our bodies, and the environment, and understand what it takes to reduce exposure.

The presenter is Northwestern University neurobiologist Nina Kraus. Dr. Kraus will address how moderate, "safe" levels of noise interferes with or harms our health and well-being as well as how it impacts the environment. She will explain the acute, chronic effects, and long-term health risks of noise pollution in the community setting. She will also address what we can do about noise pollution.

Kraus is the author of the 2021 book <u>Of Sound Mind: How Our Brains Constructs a Meaningful Sonic World</u>, published by MIT Press. She is Hugh Knowles Professor of Communication Sciences, Neurobiology, and Otolaryngology and leads the <u>Brainvolts</u> Lab at Northwestern, has more than 400 peer-reviewed scientific articles and book publications, and currently holds five patents (and three pending) for assessment of sound processing in the brain.

Glenview's Noise Ordinances

There are multiple sections of the Glenview Municipal Code that address noise. For this reason, the most relevant parts of the code are introduced here with a link to the complete ordinance. **Enforcement is on a complaint basis.**

NOTE: If you live in the "Edens Expressway Noise Impact Area", i.e. properties with common addresses of 905 to 941 Long Road, Glenview, Illinois, special building requirements apply to you in order to mitigate noise from the Edens. (See Chapter 18, Buildings and Building Regulations, Article XIV).

Chapter 46: Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions Article III: Offenses Against the Public Peace and Safety Sec. 46-104. - *Noises* generally.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person within the Village to make or continue, or cause to be made or continued, any loud, unnecessary, or unusual *noise* which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, convenience, health, peace or safety of others within the limits of the Village.
- (b) The following acts are declared to be loud, disturbing and unnecessary *noises* in violation of this section, but such enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive;

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Chapter 98: Zoning

Article VIII: Performance Standards

Section 98-371: Purpose

The land in the Village and surrounding areas is predominantly devoted to residential use. People who reside in such areas have chosen the location because of the suburban atmosphere, free from objectionable noises, smoke, odors, vibrations, and other irritants that are frequently found in more urban locations.

The performance standards contained in this article are designed to minimize operations that would disrupt the existing suburban atmosphere.

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Chapter 90: Vehicles and Traffic

Article IV: Vehicle Equipment, Size, Weight, and Load

Section 90-322: Mufflers and exhaust systems

Every motor vehicle driven or operated upon the streets of the Village shall at all times be equipped with an adequate muffler or exhaust system in constant operation and properly maintained to prevent any excessive or unusual noise. No such muffler or exhaust system shall be equipped with a cutout, bypass, or similar device. No person shall modify the exhaust system of a motor vehicle in a manner that will amplify or increase the noise of such vehicle above that emitted by the muffler originally installed on the vehicle, and such original muffler shall comply with all the requirements of this section.

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Noise Awareness Is In Your Hands (and an App)!



Want to become more knowledgeable about your personal exposure to noise?

Greener Glenview and The Grove are partnering on Sunday, September 10 for a 2-hour training and practice session on sound level meter phone apps. Earplugs will be provided. If you want to start learning on your own, download the NIOSH Sound Level Meter app (iOS) or Sound Meter (Android). FYI, the smoothie setting on a Vitamix hits 85.2 decibels. How does that compare to other sounds? Think busy restaurants and police sirens.

And Speaking of Noise: Landscaper Goes Electric

Many of us cringe when a crew arrives to mow and blow a yard in our neighborhood. Imagine hearing a soft vacuuming sound instead of that nasty

growl of a gas-powered leaf blower! That's just what we heard recently as we passed a crew working with electric blowers! Who is this landscaper who's going electric? George Cardenas Landscaping, 847 562-9144.

We called Cardenas Landscaping to thank the company for going electric and spoke with Alejandro. He said that there are many reasons to go electric. Gasoline is very expensive. Clients don't like the noise and the smell of gasoline-powered equipment. And the company would like to be as sustainable in its equipment as it can be. All backpack blowers are now electric for Cardenas crews, and the aim is to convert gradually to all-electric lawn care equipment.

The 30% tax credit on the purchase of ride-on mowers offered by the Inflation Reduction Act may help speed up Cardenas' transition to electric equipment. And going fully electric—including the mower—will help improve local air quality. The EPA reports that emissions from gas-powered lawn care equipment account for 5% of air pollution in the U.S. A four-stroke lawnmower operating for one hour equates to a vehicle traveling for 500 miles. Tree Keepers, Neighborhood Tree Walks, and Tree Care

Request a Tree Walk in your neighborhood

Glenview's generous tree canopy may be one of the reasons you moved here. The tree canopy coverage is 34%, and growing. The 2022 Urban Forest Management Plan sets a goal of increasing it to 37% in the next ten years. The Village of Glenview is responsible for planting and maintaining approximately 31,000 trees in parkways and on municipal property. Each year, they plant hundreds of new parkway trees. Park Manor Tree Walk

Residents of the Park Manor neighborhood learned about tree care in June when they attended the neighborhood Tree Walk led by Glenview's natural resources manager Robyn Flakne and several local TreeKeepers (see more on TreeKeepers and tree care below).

Love trees? Be a TreeKeeper

If you love trees, consider joining Glenview's chapter of <u>TreeKeepers</u>. The TreeKeepers program is sponsored by OpenLands, a 60-year-old organization dedicated to conservation in our region. Training in identifying and caring for trees consists of six weeks of two classes per week followed by a certifying exam. Once certified, TreeKeepers join in events to support trees planted on public land in their community.

Greener Glenview sat down recently with TreeKeepers Henrietta Saunders and Sara Spitz to learn more.

Q. What made you decide to become a certified TreeKeeper?

A. Henrietta Saunders became a TreeKeeper to stay active in conservation in Glenview after she stepped down as chairperson of the Environment and Natural Resources Commission. The Urban Forest Management Plan, updated during her tenure on the ENRC, recommended that Glenview start a TreeKeeper chapter. For Glenview Library Trustee Sara Spitz, the idea was planted at an event hosted by Robyn Flakne to educate residents in the Secret Hollow neighborhood about caring for newly planted parkway trees. Spitz says the training has changed her life. "Everyone in the neighborhood knows I'm a TreeKeeper," she said. Neighbors now ask her about tree care, and inform her of trees they think need care. Her training makes her able to do a preliminary assessment of the parkway tree and report the issue to the Public Works Department which is responsible for 31,000 trees on public and municipal property.

Q. What do TreeKeepers do?

A. TreeKeepers help take care of trees on public property. For example, this spring, Glenview's TreeKeepers met with Robyn Flakne and Director of Public Works Joe Kenney to make sure that contractors mulched newly planted parkway trees the right way. (Hint: it's not the volcano of mulch that you too often see. See more info below.). This spring TreeKeepers helped plant and mulch trees at Glenbrook South High School and at Village Hall. And in June, area TreeKeepers from Glenview, Evanston, and Winnetka joined the Park Manor Tree Walk to demonstrate proper mulching.

Q. What is the most important part of caring for a newly planted tree?

A. For baby trees, just like baby humans, the first three years are of crucial importance. Proper watering and mulching are the key parts of caring for your new tree.

Proper mulching: arrange the mulch in a donut shape, and follow the $3 \times 3 \times 3$ rule: the mulch should be 3'' away from the trunk of the tree, 3'' deep, and 3 feet in diameter for a newly planted sapling. As the tree grows, extend the mulch to the leaf line, if possible, but maintain at least the 3-foot diameter around the tree. Avoid VOLCANO mulching, even though you see so much of it. Piling mulch up against the trunk of the tree leads to disease and rot.

Proper watering? Give your tree 10-20 gallons of water a week, applied in one slow watering. Follow this rule of thumb for the first three seasons.

Heat pumps are now the technology of choice for heating homes in the US, outpacing sales of gas furnaces for the first time. Many installers, however, recommend dual fuel systems which combine a heat pump for efficient cooling and heating with a gas furnace for backup heating during the coldest times of the year. Other installers say these systems are unnecessary and a stand-alone heat pump is a better solution.

This subject will be discussed with a panel of experts who will address the pros and cons of dual fuel systems, when they might be a good solution, and the relative installation and operational cost differences between this solution and a stand-alone heat pump.
