A Three Time Winner!

For the third consecutive year, Greener Glenview has received a Village of Glenview Environmental Sustainability Award. What's better than one award? Two! Many thanks to the Greener Glenview volunteers who spearheaded the two projects winning the awards and all the volunteers who made them a success.

In the **Education and Outreach** category. . .the award goes to Attea Middle School 8th grader Arushi Bedekar and Greener Glenview volunteers Janelle and Omar Kheshgi. Arushi had a vision of a pollinator garden at the entrance to Attea, enlisted the support of Attea Principal Diana O'Donnell and worked with Janelle and Omar to design and install the garden. Arushi not only enlisted the help of classmates and after-school club faculty to make the garden a reality, she took responsibility for keeping the new plants well-watered over the summer. Arushi is

a self-starter and exhibits the strengths that her generation can offer. She is a wonderful example of the Power of One person to make a difference. Many thanks to Janelle and Omar, the heart and work horses of our Glenview Native Habitat initiative.

In the **Innovation** category. . .the award goes to the Glenview Park District and Greener Glenview volunteer and board member Ann Yoshida, who has organized the SportSwap event the past two years. This event does take a village: Ann coordinates with 20+ Greener Glenview volunteers and park district staff to work their magical publicity campaign and handle the set-up/take down of tables. SportSwap keeps used equipment out of the landfill and enables others to buy it at low cost or with credit vouchers from items they donate. In the past two years, nearly \$2,000 has been raised and donated to the Glenview Park Foundation's Recreation Leisureship Program. This fund covers the cost of participation in park district programs by those families who find it difficult or otherwise impossible to register their children district due to financial constraints.

Leaf Blowers in Glenview

We've lost count of how many of you have contacted us over the past three years regarding regulation or an outright ban of gas-powered leaf blowers, both for noise and environmental reasons. We hear you and have asked the Village staff why no

action has been taken. It is time to take very tangible action and elevate this issue to Village decision makers now, before the landscaping season begins.

Here are the facts. In 2022, Glenview's then-assistant director of public works (who left the Village at the end of 2024) participated in the Regional Leaf Blower Working Group. This group -- comprised of 22 members from 11 North Shore municipalities, representatives from the landscape industry, and Go Green Illinois leaders -- sought to bring coherence in approach to the regulation of this equipment. Their 66-page <u>Final Report</u>, released in December 2022, described best practices to consider when a community decides to limit gas-powered leaf blower use.

There has been no public discussion by our village government of the report since it was released over two years ago. As a result, no additional measures have been taken. The existing noise ordinance (Sec. 98-374(b)(9)) simply limits landscape work to certain hours: Monday-Saturday 7:00 a.m.-7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is earlier; Sunday, 9:00 a.m.- 7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is earlier.

Sign Our Petition to Regulate Gas-Powered Leaf Blowers

SIGN THE PETITION

Greener Glenview is asking residents to sign a petition to request the Village of Glenview impose restrictions on gas-powered leaf blowers. The use of gas-powered leaf blowers causes significant negative impacts on the environment and human health. These negative impacts include:

Air pollution

These blowers emit harmful pollutants like carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), and particulate matter, which contribute to smog and can cause respiratory problems, particularly for vulnerable populations like children and the elderly.

Noise pollution

The loud noise generated by gas leaf blowers can disrupt daily life, causing stress, hearing damage, and sleep disturbances for nearby residents. In addition, the noise interferes with concentration for those working or studying at home.

Climate change

The emissions from gas leaf blowers contribute directly to greenhouse gas emissions, contributing to climate change.

Ecological disruption

Blowing away leaf litter can disrupt the natural ecosystem by disturbing insects and other small animals that rely on it for shelter and food sources. Leaf blower use can be fatal to insects living in the foliage.

Health concerns

The leaf blowers' hurricane-force winds kick up dust containing pesticides and herbicides, spores, pollen, animal feces, tire residue, and heavy metals. Inhaling the fine particulate matter emitted by leaf blowers can lead to respiratory issues like asthma attacks, particularly for individuals with pre-existing conditions.

Many surrounding communities including Northbrook, Wilmette, Winnetka, Glencoe, Kenilworth, Highland Park, Lake Bluff and Evanston have imposed bans or restrictions. It is time for Glenview to do the same for the health of residents and protection of the environment.
