Greener Glenview is at a Crossroads

and managed by the Village of Glenview, presentations on the environmental and health hazards of **artificial light at night** and **noise pollution**. And, there's the annual fun community event, our late summer **SportSwap** in collaboration with the Glenview Park District.

Now we are approaching a crossroads: Greener Glenview's co-founder and president, Sheri Latash, is relocating outside Glenview in 2026. If you know or have worked with Sheri in her varied roles in the community, you know she is not easily replaceable. While this change is a loss, it is also an opportunity. Our leadership team is looking for people who want to make a difference by showing the way toward a more sustainable Glenview.

Maybe your passion is composting, getting rid of buckthorn and other invasives, improving recycling rates, reducing single use plastics, or making a quieter community by reducing gas powered leaf blower use. Maybe you want to bring back fireflies by encouraging native planting and leaving the leaves. Sustainability is a huge tent, and we're looking for people who want to make a difference alongside others working toward the same goals.

This crossroads is occurring at the same time that the Village of Glenview is nearing completing of its first **Sustainability Plan**. We do not know what opportunities this plan will offer, but we look forward to finding out.

We look forward to talking with you about what you can do to help direct Greener Glenview's future. Working together has brought us inspiration, camaraderie, and the satisfaction and hope that comes from joining others who are working toward a common goal. Final Food Scraps Drop-off Pilot Program Report (July 2025 through January 2026)

Greener Glenview's Free Food Scraps Drop-off Pilot program, funded by the Judy Beck Family Foundation grant, had three goals, all of which were accomplished:

- 1) Diverted 23,490 pounds of food waste from the landfill
- 2) Educated Glenview residents that food scraps are a resource for nourishing soils and biodiversity, not garbage to send to the landfill
- 3) Demonstrated the community's support for more robust composting services

Many thanks to those of you who generously donated funds that enabled the pilot program to continue for four additional months. And, to the volunteers who regularly checked the bins to make sure everything was in good order; your efforts were greatly appreciated.

The complete success of our collective effort was confirmed when the Village decided to continue the program through 2026. The Village of Glenview assumed funding and management of the program beginning February 1.

The Numbers Tell the Story

We sent a follow-up survey to the 226 households who registered for the pilot. Undoubtedly, many people participated without registering. The survey questions were composed in collaboration with staff from Glenview Public Works. Here are highlights and comments from the survey responses:

The response rate was 31.4%. Of the 226 registered households, 71 responded.

- All wanted the program to continue
- 68 now know more about composting (including 14 who "don't think it's icky anymore")
- 42 reported this was their first time composting

Why was the program so popular?

- 65 thought it was simple and easy to use
- 50 reported no other way to compost (HOA rules, Groot bin not an option, or free service made it possible)
- 62 noticed cleaner and/or less garbage going to the landfill
- 68 noticed how much we throw away/are buying just what we need/ are eating more leftovers so we throw away less

Thank you to all who participated, and thank you to the Village of Glenview for continuing this beneficial service.

What's our next step in composting?

Some of us have been so impressed by the volume of food waste collected in this pilot, that we want to extend outreach to other parts of the Glenview community. One big idea is to launch a lunchroom composting program at a Glenview school. Or, we could stage a finished compost giftback to show how beneficial and easy-to-use finished compost is for homeowners with lawns and gardens to care for. There are many possibilities. when she lived in Evanston, joined [Wild Ones](#) (an organization which promotes native landscapes), and heard Doug Tallamy talk for the first time about the possibilities of native garden corridors. She was inspired! She brought that idea to Greener Glenview at its inception, and her impetus created our grant-funded [Glenview Native Habitat](#) program. She has nurtured the involvement of individuals in this movement ever since, working with them to get their native gardens designated by the [National Wildlife Federation](#) as certified wildlife habitats.

Janelle and Omar have enjoyed meeting like-minded people through Greener Glenview, and are heartened by the good attendance that they see at our meetings. Here are some of the practices that they try to incorporate into their daily lives:

- walking and biking when they can—to the grocery store and the library in particular.
- reducing the number of air miles they fly
- avoiding over-consumption of goods
- eating more vegetables and less red meat
- reducing use of things like Kleenex, paper towels and plastic wrap. Janelle uses a cloth handkerchief, has sewn paper towel replacement squares out of Omar's old t-shirts and uses reusable food storage alternatives.

- hanging up clothes to dry!

Here are the items you can recycle at Village Hall, Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.
